In their 34 years in the Iowa State University community, Mr. and Mrs. Parks have been friends of the Library in every sense. Their association with Iowa State University began in 1948 when he joined the faculty as professor of political science. Except for a two-year absence, they have been here continuously as Mr. Parks advanced to dean of instruction, vice president for academic affairs, and president of the university.

Mr. Parks now is completing his 19th year as president, the longest tenure of Iowa State's 11 presidents. Few current presidents of major universities in the United States can match the length of his service. Fewer still can match the quality of his service.



The Parks administration is distinguished as the era of the most dramatic growth in enrollment, academic programs, and physical facilities in the history of the university. Expansions of the Library building, the collections, and services reflect his vigorous leadership.

The deep interest of Mrs. Parks in the Library also is well known. Herself a scholar, with a doctoral degree in political science, she has taken a special interest in various aspects of the Library and is one of its most consistent users.

For these reasons and more, Iowa State University and the State Board of Regents have deemed it fitting that the building should bear the names of William Robert Parks and Ellen Sorge Parks.

The William Robert Parks and Ellen Sorge Parks Library stands today as a remarkable resource at the heart of Iowa State University. Collections total 1.5 million books and journals and 3.5 million other research materials. Nationally recognized for its scientific and agricultural strengths, the Library is also the home for the Archives of American Agriculture and the American Archives of the Factual Film.

In the past decade and a half with the strong and dedicated support of President W. Robert Parks, Library resources have tripled, services have expanded, and new technologies have been introduced to better serve university teaching, research, and extension.

In 1978 the Board of Governors of the Iowa State University Foundation initiated a major Library Fund. Through private donations, the fund has supported and supplemented planning and building of a new Library Addition, remodeling, equipment, and endowments for books. In 1980 the State of Iowa appropriated \$8.1 million for construction of the Library Addition and provided an additional \$1.5 million for furnishings and equipment.

The university's "Excellence in the Eighties" campaign, of which the Library Fund is an integral part, continues Iowa State's significant drive for further Library development. Countless alumni, faculty, students, and friends are joined in this essential ongoing effort.

Construction of the Library Addition began August 1980 with public opening on August 15, 1983. Phase II of the project covering remodeling of the earlier structure is now under way with completion scheduled for 1986. Total project cost is estimated at \$13.1 million.
